1 INTRODUCTION

Good afternoon Honorable Chairwoman Donna Frett Gregory, 2 distinguished members of the Committee on Finance, other members 3 of the 35th Legislature, members of the press, the viewing and 4 listening audience. I am Caroline Fawkes, Supervisor of Elections, a 5 Certified Elections Registration Administrator. Appearing with me 6 today is the Board of Elections Chairwoman, Alecia Wells, also a 7 Certified Elections Registration Administrator. It is an honor to 8 appear before you today to present the Elections System of the Virgin 9 Islands' Fiscal Year (FY) 2024 proposed budget, which includes the 10 Board of Elections and the Office of the Supervisor along with our 11 accomplishments, challenges, and goals. 12

First, I will begin with a quote from the great Martin Luther King, Jr.
who proclaimed, "Voting is the foundation stone for political action."
The Board of Elections is the elected policy-making body of the
Election System of the Virgin Islands.

The Board of Elections consists of fourteen (14) members from the
St. Thomas/St. John and St. Croix districts for a four (4) year term.
Two (2) of the members in the St. Thomas-St. John District must be
residents of St. John.

The Board of Elections Members are Chairwoman Mrs. Alecia Wells,
Vice Chairwoman – Mrs. Shikima Jones-Sprauve, Secretary Lydia
Hendricks, Members – Florine Audain Hassell, Kareem T. Francis,
Atanya Springette Boschulte, Lisa Harris-Moorhead, Esq., Epiphane
Joseph, Michael A. Joseph, Esq., Angeli Leerdam, Harriet Mercer
Lilliana Belardo de O'Neal, Arturo Watlington, Jr. Esq, and Raymond
J. Williams.

The Office of the Supervisor of Elections is charged with the day-to-28 day administration of the Election System of the Virgin Islands. One 29 of our main responsibilities is maintaining the integrity of elections 30 by assuring that Virgin Islanders' voices are heard clearly through 31 the election process. Other responsibilities include training election 32 officials, qualifying candidates for elections, administering campaign 33 finance, managing the territory-wide voter registry, hiring and 34 training poll workers, acquiring and equipping polling places, 35 registering voters and issuing voter information cards, removing 36 voters from the registered voter rolls who no longer live in the Virgin 37 Islands, are deceased, or for any other reason are no longer eligible 38 to vote in the Virgin Islands of the United States, changing 39 information on registered voter rolls when a change request is 40

received (e.g., name, address, party affiliation), sending advance notice of election to voters who are overseas, in the military, or who request notification, accept mail absentee ballot requests and send, receive, and verifying mail ballots, qualifying candidates for territorial offices, preparation for the execution of all elections, testing of all voting equipment, mandating election audits, and providing certified election returns to the Board of Elections.

I commend this body, all members of the 34th Legislature for 48 unanimously supporting Bills No. 34-319, 34-320, 34-321, 34-322, 49 34-323, 34-457, 34-460, 34-461 and 34-462 and signed by Governor 50 Bryan creating Act 8690. With the passage of these amendments, the 51 execution of elections falls under the purview of the Office of the 52 Supervisor of Elections in line with other jurisdictions in the United 53 States. For the past sixty years, the Board of Elections has done a 54 remarkable job conducting elections and now the Office of the 55 Supervisor will maintain these ambitious standards and continue to 56 build upon our past successes. Our elections are on the top tier in 57 the region and our sights are on the world. The 2024 Election Cycle 58 will be the first in which the Office of the Supervisor of Elections will 59

solely execute the Election cycle. My team and I are excited as we
prepare for this enormous task.

On another note, we need help. A new Brennan Center poll finds that 62 election officials are under attack and leaving their jobs. Between 63 January 31 and February 14 of 2022, the Benenson Strategy Group 64 polled nearly 600 local election officials about their jobs. Their 65 responses should set off warning bells across all levels of government 66 and provoke action from Congress and local legislatures. More than 67 half of the respondents are concerned about the safety of themselves 68 and their colleagues. 69

I regret to inform this body that this type of activity has reached our beautiful Virgin Islands. The integrity, character, and efficiency, of our leadership team and employees who are professional and honest in executing the duties of the system No such distraction for unearned political gain can ever and will never impair the abilities of the system.

As a prelude to today's ESVI Budgetary Hearing before this august
body, I was directed by the Board of Elections (BOE) at its July 25,
2023, Quarterly Meeting to state that despite complaints filed by

candidates suffering the agony of defeat, ESVI, using its triple
redundancy accuracy protocol, has not an iota of doubt about the
2022 general election cycle.

In the meanwhile, the elections systems of our brothers and sisters in Tortola, Anguilla and other neighbors have consulted the ESVI for its protocols. And when BOE and ESVI staff travel for interactions with other systems, in the Caribbean or the US Mainland, ESVI often receive compliments as to its more technology advanced voting systems.

I had a bird's-eye view on the effect this experience had on said employee for only performing assigned duties. Candidates and supporters of candidates during and after the election continue to attack election officials with either Misinformation, Dis-information, and Mal-information.

To counter this "infodemic," we have taken various steps and we will
continue to push back to combat misinformation:

Everyone should speak out loudly for their own individual rights. We
cannot allow a few lonely minority voices to cause apathy, while they
vote but dissuade others from voting.

Our Commitment to Our Voters - The staff commits to excellence in
maintaining up-to-date, accurate voter registration rolls to provide
fair and equal opportunities for all qualified voters to participate in
the democratic process.

I would like to recognize and thank, the twelve phenomenal, 102 knowledgeable, experienced, and driven Elections staff, Ms. Kevermay 103 Douglas - St. Thomas/St. John Deputy Supervisor, Mr. Terrell 104 Alexandre - St. Croix Deputy Supervisor, Ms. Milagritos Venzen, Mrs. 105 Ulette Todmann-Hodge - Senior Elections Assistants, Ms. Sheri 106 Richardson, Ms. Melba Smith, Ms. Mari Felix, Ms. Stephanie Joseph, 107 Ms. Tricia Johnson, Mrs. Blanca Maldonado -Election Assistants, 108 Board Executive Assistant - Mr. Richard Wilson. 117 OFFICE OF THE SUPERVISOR PROPOSED 2023 BUDGET

Today, I am here to make a compelling request for your support ofour lumpsum budget proposal.

The law which mandates to whom we submit our budget follows 120 Virgin Islands Code Title 18, Chapter 3, §47. Jurisdiction, powers 121 and duties of the Joint Board, section 12, "the Board of Elections 122 must annually prepare and submit the budget, directly to the 123 Legislature, independent of the executive budget of the Governor for 124 the cost of the registration and party enrollment of electors, of 125 primaries and elections, and of the expenses of the board, for the 126 ensuing fiscal year". Every year, most members of this legislative 127 body accept what the Office of Management & Budget submits over 128 what we propose, the Agency in the trenches. How can the actual for 129 FY 2022 state we expended over \$2,700,000.00 and we are here with 130 a proposal of \$2,500,000.00? We continue to enhance our processes 131 and our equipment, for the public, while our proposed budget is 132

stagnated or decreased. For the Election System to function 133 effectively, we must spend funds to maintain and continuously 134 Modernization enhance our equipment. and technology 135 enhancement is not cheap. We are tired of robbing Peter to pay Paul. 136 The time is now to change this approach; we have outgrown this 137 practice; we should be treated as a senior organization. We are sixty 138 years old, as of February 20, 2023. If we do not receive adequate 139 conduct the Primary, General Election, funding to or the 140 Constitutional Convention in the Appropriation in 2024, we will not 141 be able to conduct those elections. Funding for these elections should 142 be appropriated in Fiscal Year 2024 and this funding should remain 143 available until it is expended. Acts 8474 and 8590 appropriated a 144 total of \$500,000.00 to conduct the Elections in Fiscal Year 2022 but 145 the Act did not state until funding is expended. Therefore, 146 \$189,763.70 lapsed on September 30, 2022, however, the General 147 Election was November 8, 2022. We had to request a Supplemental 148 Budget of \$100,000.00 to carry us through 2023. With no alternative, 149 I took General Funds from the Office of the Supervisor's Budget to 150 take care of the Election Officials and Vendors for the 2022 General 151 Election. 152

Every enhancement or upgraded equipment purchased from 2014 to
now has been with federal funds, totaling over \$2,034,893.00.

A subset of Maintenance of Effort is supplement-not-supplant, where federal grant funds shall supplement, not supplant (or replace), a recipient's non-federal funds which would otherwise have been made available for the applicable program. The federal government will not continue to invest in the Elections Systems of the Virgin Islands if the Virgin Islands Government fails to invest in us.


Please have the media show the Fiscal Year Funding PowerPoint 161 **Presentation (Appendix B)** of six slides to show our funding for the 162 past eleven years. This clearly shows the flatlined budget the 163 Elections System of the Virgin Islands has continued for over nine 164 years. For nine years, we were below the federally mandated 165 "Maintenance of Expenditure" amount of \$2,400,000.00 mandated 166 once the Help America Vote Act was implemented in the ESVI, 2002. 167 The ESVI received their first Federal Grant in 2003. You can see the 168 peak in 2012, this may have been after the Federal Auditors visit. 169 However, our Budget has flat line ever since, which is detrimental to 170 us. If you had at least a 5% growth each year, this would equal an 171 \$1,080,000.00, today we would additional be asking for 172

\$3,080,000.00. Please take note, you cannot combine the Board of
Elections Budget with the Office of the Supervisor Budget to obtain a
total, and then think we are satisfying the federal mandate; we are
not and have not for over nine years. I will continue to harp on this
every budget cycle.

178 ESVI Office of the Supervisor proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2024

179 is for **\$3,000,000.00.**

An estimate of 53% of the budget is spent on Salaries and Fringe
Benefits for eight (8) classified employees and three (3) exempt
employees, 36% on Other Services and Charges which includes
Professional Services, Training, Rental of Land/Building, Capital
Outlays – 6%, Communication & Security, Supplies – 3% and
Utilities – 5%.



187 For FY2024 the budget proposal is as follows: Personnel Services-

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\$1,400,000.00, Capital Outlays - \$30,000.00, Fringe Benefits \$436,100.00, Supplies - \$65,000.00, Professional Services and
Training -\$982,900.00 and Utility Services - \$85,500.00.

191 The need for equipment, salary increases, and services are detailed192 below:

a. The three Managerial Staff were approved for salary increases not
taken into consideration in the budget proposal sent down by the
Office of Management and Budget, which ignores the law, VIC 18,
Section 47 (12), and the mandated salary increases of the Elections
Staff every two years in accordance with Executive Order 508-2020.
All classified staff are at their current step based on the Pay Plan.

This is estimated at \$314,000.00 including salaries and fringe
benefits. The Manager's salaries have not increased for over three
years, after over seven years with no salary increases, while the Line
Staff receive a salary increase every two years by Executive Order.
b. We have a new position as of this fiscal year with a salary of
\$60,000.00, Administrator, Fiscal & Personnel Services Staff.
Which also is not factored into the proposed Budget received from

206 OMB.

c. Many citizens request we conduct more Forums or Townhalls.
Everything required to conduct a Forum has a funding
requirement, from rental of the location, sound system, promotion
and livestreaming or videotaping the event.

d. Two Promethean boards for the Training Rooms/Conference Rooms
of the Elections Offices – St. Croix and St. Thomas. Estimated cost
\$15,000.00 each.

e. Replacement of the two or one of the district 2014 vans – upgrade
to mobile voting van with ability to register and obtain a voter's
identification card on site and provide a lift ramp to load and onload
the demonstration voting machines. Deputy Supervisor Douglas, a
few board members and I were able to tour one of Denver City's

mobile voting vans in August 2022. We met with Mr. Daniel Sotelo,
Operations Coordinator of the Office of the Clerk and Recorder for
the City and County of Denver. An estimate for two new
replacement vehicles is over \$600,000.00. I foresee us obtaining
one at a time, when we can support this in our budget.

- f. Increase in Professional Services Contracts costs, due to increasein the amount of voting equipment on hand.
- g. Contracts with various Strategic Communications Teams based onthe project at hand; planned and unplanned.
- h. Funding to support Legal Fees, when necessary, or hire an Attorneyon retainer.
- i. As of July 15, 2023, the Office of the Supervisor has expended
 \$1,714,561.00 (71%) of its budget.

232 Primary and General Elections Miscellaneous Budget


The Elections System of the Virgin Islands is requesting the following funding to conduct the elections - \$350,000.00 for the Primary and \$600,000.00 for the General Election. For the 2020 election cycle, both the Primary and the General Election Budget was appropriated in FY 2019. Ever since then we have received the elections budget in the prior fiscal year. The reason for this is the election cycle begins

after the Primary election and obtaining the funding in late October 239 would hamper the preparations and execution of our operations. We 240 now find ourselves in a catch twenty-two, by obtaining the funding 241 in the prior year, the funds expire prior to us obligating all of it. This 242 explanation was shared with us this fiscal year, and we lost 243 \$189,763.20. The balance that was not expended lapsed at the end 244 of FY 22 since the funds were not available until expended. I was 245 informed by the Office of Management and Budget, to be sure the 246 Legislature makes your appropriation available until expended the 247 fund should be appropriated to object code 0101 instead of 0100. 248





The St. Croix Inactive Listing was posted in the following agencies: 264 Department of Human Services, Licensing & Consumers Affairs, 265 Water & Power Authority, and the Elections Office. There is also a QR 266 Code on the cover page, therefore, any person can scan it for 267 additional information or to complete the reinstatement form online. 268 We also encourage all voters to utilize the voter lookup to confirm 269 your registration status and polling location. The instructions are on 270 the tab on our website, www.vivote.gov. 271

Enter your name, physical address zip code, and year of birth. If yourphysical address zip code does not work, please try your mailing

address zip code. All fields are required. We continue to utilize new
methods and aggressive initiatives to encourage all citizens to register
to vote and participate in the electoral process.

To keep our database current and accurate, we continue to receive from the Department of Health quarterly Deceased Report. The last report was received on August 1st, which was current as of the end June 30, 2023.

THE BOARD OF ELECTIONS PROPOSED FY2024 BUDGET:

The Board of Elections is requesting \$427,860.00 for Fiscal Year 282 2024 as follows: Personnel Services- \$75,760.00, Fringe Benefits -283 \$23,599.24, Supplies - \$10,000.00 and Other Services, Training & 284 Stipends - \$235,300.76. Thirty-five percent of the Board of Elections 285 budget is expended on Salaries & Fringe benefits for the 286 Administrative Assistant, Stipends, Supplies, Voter Education 287 outreach, Legal Fees, Election specific Training and Certification -288 Election Center. With this being an election year, the Board Members 289 will be conducting more meetings, voting equipment demonstrations, 290 training, and travel to the US mainland for conferences. An Executive 291 Assistant was hired by the Board of Elections effective June 4, 2023, 292 with a salary of \$60,000.00. 293

294 **ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

²⁹⁵ Fiscal Year 2023 accomplishments:

A. Introduced modern technology in the acquisition of the Next 296 Generation E-Poll books. This new and exciting technology shares 297 real-time data with the Express Poll Connect web-based services, 298 which allows election administrators to monitor voter logs by location 299 on Election Day. For example, if one voted at Tutu Park Mall Voting 300 Center and attempted to vote at any other Voting Center, they would 301 not be able to, because their name would be shown in red. This serves 302 as a flag to the E-Poll book Clerk. The Clerk will then go through the 303 appropriate protocol, because the E-Poll books communicate this 304 information with all Voting Centers. Due to the success of the Next 305 Generation E-Poll Books, ESVI ordered an additional twenty (20) E-306 poll books with the Security Grant to ensure sufficient, efficient 307 coverage and expansion of the voting centers. 308

B. The National Voter Registration Day Expo was held territorially,
Saturday, October 1, 2022. It was an amazing day, and our
success would not have occurred without our partners
(Department of Human Services, the Virgin Islands Territorial

Emergency Management Agency, American Association of Retired Persons (AARP), Public Service Commission, The Disability Rights Center of the Virgin Islands) dedication, and outstanding performance. From the bottom of my heart, thank you. I am grateful to have their support. We hope to welcome them back for the 2024 Elections Expo.

C. Premium Pay was paid to all staff members who were below the \$70,000.00 threshold. Three staff members were over the \$70,000.00 threshold and hopefully, the affected staff members can receive their premium pay for the work conducted during the 2020 Election Cycle.

D. Implemented Bill 34-0266, ACT 8602- which allows all persons eligible to vote in the Virgin Islands to vote in any election by absentee ballot for any reason and allows any registered voter to submit their ballot via facsimile.

E. Implemented Act No. 8648 amended Title 18 Virgin Islands Code, Chapter 7, Section 158 to increase the compensation of election officers and clerks to receive compensation from the Board of Elections which appointed them, as follows: **1.** Each judge of

332	election, \$250; 2. Each inspector of election, \$225; 3. Each clerk
333	of election, \$200; and 4 . Each voting machine monitor, \$200.
334	Elections Officials are the face of elections and ensure that every
335	registered voter can cast their ballot in a fair, accessible, secure,
336	and transparent manner.
337	Remember this compensation is not for one day, it is for the fifteen
338	or twenty-two Early Voting days as well and for every day the
339	Voting Technician must come in to prepare for an election.
340	F. Successfully conducted the 2022 General Election on Tuesday,
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\$55,000.00.

H. The Elections System of the Virgin Islands was able to produce the 350 2022 General Election results by 8:30 PM on Election Night 351 compared to the Primary Election when the results were produced 352 around 11:31 PM. ESVI obtained the EVS 6.2.0.0 Reporting 353 Standard Standalone Central Processing Unit for a cost of 354 \$17,000.00 with federal funds from our voting machine 355 manufacturer which removed the manual process of transferring 356 election results in each district. 357

I. The Board of Elections added the following Committees this year;
Education and Strategic Plan & Townhalls.

J. Our website <u>www.vivote.gov</u> has been enhanced and rebranded
with vibrant images, user friendly tabs creating a top-notched
informational website. Our website can be viewed in five
languages, English, Spanish, Haitian Creole, French, and Dutch.
A notice is posted at the bottom of the webpage in compliance with
the American Disability Act.

K. Celebrated our 60th Anniversary on February 20, 2023. We held
various events such as, an Open House Reception and
Retrospective Exhibit at our St. Croix Office, which launched the
month activities, an Honoree Reception at Government House

honoring present and past staff, former Supervisors, and Deputy 370 Supervisors of Elections, the longest serving poll workers, past and 371 present board members. The staff, Board Members and Poll 372 Workers participated in a historic exploration of the Ruins on St. 373 John. The 60th Anniversary Jubilee Gala was held on February 374 25, 2023, at The Ritz Carlton Resort on St. Thomas. The guest 375 speaker, Commissioner Thomas Hicks, of the Elections Assistance 376 Commission, made history by visiting the St. Thomas/St. John 377 District. This was the first territory he had ever visited, since being 378 appointed by Former President Barack H. Obama in 2015. His 379 presentation was entitled "Remaining Ever Vigilant in Ensuring 380 Access and the Right to Vote!" This topic was relevant, 381 informative, and encouraging for the present time. Calypsonian 382 Bernard Liburd wrote a calypso in tribute to our organization and 383 Ms. Jonicia Cardin authored a poem celebrating our sixty years. 384 Both were original, intriguing, and inspirational - epic. 385

I take this opportunity to thank Mr. Ricky Joseph for designing our60th Anniversary logo.

388 L. Our next five months Anniversary Events are as follows:

Marking Milestones Episode 3 - The Legislators to be released in the third quarter.

391 District Forums in October/November: Naturalization--Home is 392 Where My Vote Is, to be released in the fourth quarter.

Marking Milestones Episode 4 – Featuring the present USVI Governor
and three ESVI Board Members, one from each island to be released
in the fourth quarter.

"Civics Matters" - October 7, 2023 - 10 a.m., a competition which
will showcase the knowledge of high school students will be held on
St. Croix. The place to be determined.

Also, please note that our website continues to be an excellent source of information about past elections and upcoming elections and provides important

407 verifiable and reliable data that can be utilized by candidates and the408 public.

M. In February 2023, the Elections System of the Virgin Islands 409 received another Help America Vote Federal Grant for Cyber 410 Security Training. The awarded grant amount was \$200,000.00. 411 This grant is combined with the prior year Cyber Security Grant 412 with the addition of the \$200,000.00 in May 2022, the current 413 balance is \$335,863.80. The Elections System of the Virgin Islands 414 has always expended 100% of all grant award funding, under my 415 leadership, in accordance with federal mandates. I have 416 successfully closed out two grants thus far, 2012 and 2020 CARES 417 ACT Grants. This new grant will expire on September 30, 2027. 418 N. Representatives of the ESVI attended the U.S. Elections Assistance 419 Commission (EAC) Standards Board Meeting held on April 16-20, 420 2023, in Phoenix, Arizona. Chairwoman Wells was appointed to 421 the Voluntary Voting System Guideline serve on (VVSG) 422 Committee and I on the Standards & Practices Committee. 423 Voluntary Voting System Guidelines (VVSG) are a set of 424 specifications and requirements against which voting systems can 425

be evaluated to determine if they meet required standards. Some
factors examined under these tests include basic functionality,
accessibility, and security capabilities. disabilities to vote privately
and independently. We have been participating in this certification
program since we purchased the voting equipment in 2012.

O. Deputy Supervisors, Ms. Kevermay Douglas and Mr. Terrell 431 Alexandre visited the British Virgin Islands (BVI) as Elections 432 Observers. As Election Officials, we are encouraged to visit foreign 433 jurisdictions and the various states to serve as Election Observers. 434 They were also proud to see that some of the successful pointers 435 we shared with the BVI Government in our 2020 and 2022 436 Elections were implemented. This was the first year that the BVI 437 held Advance Voting, this was based on our Absentee Voting 438 tenants tailored to what they require. Performing duties as 439 Election Observers is a long-standing tradition. 440

P. Please allow me to introduce and compliment ESVI Employees of
the Year. The STX Employee of the Year – Ms. Mari Felix has 25
years in the STT/STJ District – Ms. Milagritos Venzen has 22 years
of service to the St. Croix District. This is the second time they
both have earned this memorable recognition under my tenure. To

them and their families, I say "Thanks for Your ExemplaryService."

Q. On Thursday, June 1st, we enrolled in the Electronic Verification 448 of Vital Events (EVVE) Fact of Death (FOD) by the National 449 Association for Public Health Statistics and Information Systems 450 (NAPHSIS). EVVE FOD is an innovative death matching system 451 that matches against the most accurate death data in the nation: 452 the death record databases of vital records offices. This will cost 453 us \$4,000.00 per year, monies well spent. It is a new requirement 454 we did not have in Fiscal Year 2023. 455

R. Secretary Ms. Lydia Hendricks, Members Mr. Raymond J. 456 Williams, Atty. Lisa Harris Moorhead, Mr. Kareem T. Francis, and 457 Deputy Supervisor Mr. Terrell Alexandre attended the International 458 Association of Government Officials Conference, June 21-28, 2023, 459 in Dallas, Texas. The International Association of Government 460 Officials is the leading organization for government officials, fostering 461 excellence in public service through education, innovation, and 462 networking. 463

S. On July 11th students from the "Youth Arise Visions and Dreams"
Summer Program visited the STT Elections Office. Accompanying the

students were program coordinator, Mr. Alston Creque, and his 466 assistant, Ms. Karissa Victorine. Deputy Supervisor Douglas, 467 Chairwoman Wells and Secretary Hendricks hosted this event. Ms. 468 Douglas did an election presentation and the board members 469 assisted with the voting machines demonstration. The students were 470 also treated to lunch. They were introduced to a fascinating and 471 educating world of the voting process which also included an exciting 472 and age-appropriate popular music video about the importance of 473 voting. 474

T. Board Member Mrs. Florine Audain-Hassell, Mr. Epiphane Joseph, 475 and staff Mrs. Ulette Todmann-Hodge, Ms. Tricia R. Johnson, Ms. 476 Mari C. Felix, Ms. Sheri Richardson, and Deputy Supervisor Terrell 477 Alexandre are currently taking the Election Center Course which will 478 lead to the completion of The Election Centers Professional Education 479 Program (PEP). The program consists of two major parts. After 480 completion of certain coursework and additional requirements, you 481 can become a Certified Elections/Registration Administrator (CERA). 482 The CERA, CERV, or CEM designation is to be honored. 483

484 U. Mrs. Audain-Hassell, Mr. Joseph, Ms. Johnson, and Mr.
485 Alexandre are expected to obtain their CERA certification during

Fiscal Year 2024. Many other staff members have taken a few of the
election courses and are encouraged to complete their certification.
We promote training for growth, shared experience, networking, and
the continuing integrity of our work.

V. We welcomed back Ms. Je'Laisah Roebuck as a summer intern
from Monday, June 5, 2023, to Wednesday, July 19, 2023. Ms.
Roebuck will be a junior at the St. Croix Central High School when
school reopens. Ms. Roebuck was instrumental during the 2022
Primary Election, and we were eager to welcome her back and
grateful for the opportunity to help train the next generation.

W. Mr. Richard Wilson was selected as the Executive Assistant forthe Board of Elections on June 5, 2023.

While any organization or individual can be the target of a cyberattack, cybersecurity is especially important for an electoral organization. Our voting equipment is not connected to the internet. Our computers and other sensitive systems are constantly monitored by the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security (CIS) Agency with monthly reports such as the CISA Cyber Threat Assessments - Cyber Hygiene. To date all our reports have been negative.

505 GOALS

Our mission is to conduct reliable, accessible, secure, and transparent elections and accurately maintain voter registration records for Virgin Islands citizens. The goal is to make the voter registration process easier by providing uniform registration services through drivers' license registration centers, disability centers, online, and mail-in registration. To increase and improve our voter registration database, ESVI will implement the following:

a. An online database that allows U.S. citizens to register to vote by 513 mail using mail-in-forms or online in accordance with the Election 514 Assistance Commission. Our webmaster will create a platform on our 515 website, www.vivote.gov, to allow voters to register to vote, change 516 their address, change their party affiliation, transfer their voter 517 registration from each District, and cancel their voter registration 518 locally or in any U.S jurisdiction. The projected goal for 519 implementation is September 1, 2023. We will verify the documents 520 prior to completing the registration process by sending the voter a 521 confirmation postcard. This is also a cost, estimated at \$75,000.00 522 not factored in the recommended FY2024 Budget. 523

524 b. Act 8690 permitted voter registration at the Bureau of Motor 525 Vehicles (BMV). Registration at the BMV requires additional

discussion to determine each agency's role and responsibilities. We previously held meetings with BMV Director Barbara Jackson-McIntosh to improve the bill. Funding would be required to implement this program with the buildout of the platform to register to vote, salary increases for the BMV Staff, (if operating outside their scope of work per Union contract), transfer data from the BMV to ESVI, and the maintenance cost of the platform.

c. The Board approved at its July meeting to purchase the seventy
(70) Express Vote Universal Voting System Printers at a cost of
\$65,000.00 utilizing the HAVA Grant Federal Funds.

This printer will simplify the set-up and shut-down process for poll 536 workers; dismisses the need for special transportation or need for 537 large storage space due to its compact size; reduces wait time as it is 538 ready to print 5 seconds after turning it on; prints up to a 19-inch 539 activation card in just 5 seconds; eliminates ballot waste as it prints 540 on demand; eliminates the need for toner; accelerates the voter 541 check-in process with a secure, hardwired connection to the Express 542 Poll electronic pollbook; and improves the voter experience as voters 543 will receive the activation card that correctly identifies the correct 544 ballot information. 545

546 CHALLENGES

547 a. The non-receipt of adequate General Funds for the Office of the548 Supervisor to operate effectively and efficiently.

b. We had one outstanding vendor payment for the Elections System 549 and Software (ESS) in the amount of \$41,859.50 for quarterly 550 maintenance fees prior to August 9th. This payment was process 551 with approved Justification Letter in accordance 31 VIC, Section 552 239 (a) (8) & Section1301. We cannot pay the full year of the ESS 553 contract with a monthly allotment of \$208,325.00, because this will 554 leave us with insufficient funds to even pay bi-weekly salaries along 555 with many other required expenses. 556

c. Educating, empowering, and motivating more citizens to registerand voters to participate in the Elections.

d. The Elections System of the Virgin Islands has worked tirelessly
and continues to submit proposed revisions to Title 18 of the Virgin
Islands Code, with input from the public and other organizations.
However, we need the Legislature to seriously look at total election
reform. In the past, only certain sections of the Title 18 would be
amended. There are numerous sections in Title 18 that conflict with
other sections in Title 18 and other sections that no longer apply

due to advancements in technology. In 2015, Senator Gittens 566 alongside other members of the 31st Legislature of the Virgin 567 Islands met with the Board members and staff of the Elections 568 System and reviewed Title 18 in its entity with the intent of revising 569 the whole of Title 18. However, only certain sections, along with 570 some cosmetics in wording were passed by this body which 571 included creating a unified Board of Elections. I appeared before 572 this body a year ago, speaking on creating the laws to prevent a 573 felon from running for the office of the Governor again. To date, no 574 action has been taken by this body. 575

e. Three other measures that need to be addressed in Virgin Islands 576 Code Title 18. First, that the Governor and Lieutenant Governor 577 should be selected from the opposite district, secondly, no one 578 convicted of a felony can run for the following offices: governor, 579 lieutenant governor nor delegate, thirdly, the time to file the 580 Nomination Petitions and Papers is by a certain date by 5 p.m. but 581 the pickup time is by 6 p.m. We recommend the times be reversed, 582 the filing time should be the later time, of 6 p.m. Fourth, the 583 campaign contribution should be increased to \$3,500.00. The cost 584 of everything relative to campaigning has increased, even to a pencil 585

with your campaign slogan on it. These measures must be in black 586 and white, the days of the gentlemen agreement is outdated; we 587 need to codify laws in Title 18 especially in areas where the Revised 588 Organic Act of 1954 is silent. The law mandates that election laws 589 should be changed no later than six months prior to a General 590 Election, however, we prefer to change laws in a non-election year 591 to ensure that voters are educated to make an informed decision 592 relative to the new laws. I can cite many more examples. I have been 593 repeating this plea since 2013, The Virgin Islands Elections Laws 594 are outdated and ambiguous, therefore, I look forward to returning 595 to this body to testify on needed statutory revision of bills. We must 596 acknowledge that, "All change may not be progress, but all progress 597 is the result of change" by John Wooden. 598

f. During the Legislative Session held on Thursday, July 20, 2023, members of the 35th Legislature favorably approved to Bill 35-0036/BR35-318 and forwarded to the Governor for further consideration and action. For the record, the Elections System stated from the beginning Act 8386 was seriously flawed with the dates by the Legislative Sponsors. The Elections System by law must be ready to conduct any "Special" Election and we are. The Elections System of the Virgin Islands awaits the approved Act to begin preparing for the election of delegates of the Sixth Constitutional Convention during the 2024 Election Cycle. I thank Senate President Novelle E. Francis, Jr. as the sponsor and Senators of the 35th Legislature of the Virgin Islands for approving this bill.

612 g. Further reduce the number of Provisional Ballots in the St. Thomas

613 St. John District. We hope to see the fruits of our labor in the 2024

Election Cycle, with the advent of the Voting Centers.

615 h. Training and Travel costs have increased exponentially over the last

616 fifteen (15) years, while our budget remains stagnant.

617 i. The important dates for the 2024 Election Cycle are:

I humbly ask that this body grant us the Fiscal 2024 Budget 620 requested for the Elections System of the Virgin Islands in the 621 amount of \$3,000,000.00 and the Board of Elections in the amount 622 of \$427,860.00 to continue to raise the standards and performance 623 of our organization. ESVI continues to be on the forefront in the 624 elections industry by implementing innovative technology, educating 625 our Board members and staff, and creating and revising election laws 626 to better serve our voters. 627

The Government of the U.S. Virgin Islands would not exist without our agency.
