**SUBJECT: Bill No.- 35-0207-**An Act amending Title 19, Virgin Islands Code, Part I adding Chapter 6a to create the Territorial Chronic Kidney Disease and Diabetes Registry

## AMENDMENT TO THE VIRGIN ISLANDS CODE

Title 19 Virgin Islands Code, Part I will be amended, as the addition of a new Chapter 6a, title "Territorial Chronic Kidney Disease and Diabetes Registry" with eight (8) sections 121-128 be included in the code. Section 121 defines the terms used; Section 122 establishes the Registry; Section 123 describes how and what entities participate; Section 124 discusses confidentiality; Section 125 addresses what disclosures are allowed; Section 126 addresses liability; Section 127 sets out penalties for violation of mandates; and Section 128 sets out the annual reporting requirements.

## ANALYSIS

A Registry is an organized system for the collection, storage, retrieval, analysis, and dissemination of information on individual person who have either a particular disease, a condition (e.g., a risk factor) that predisposes to occurrence of a health-related event, or prior exposure to substances.

Public health registries could include, but not limited to: birth defects registries, chronic diseases registries and traumatic injury registries etc. In addition, public health registries operated by patient safety and quality improvement organizations that enable knowledge generation or process improvement regarding the diagnosis, therapy and prevention of conditions that affect a population could be considered. <u>www.cdc.gov</u>

According to Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) public health registries may be sponsored or maintained by Public Health Agencies (PHAs) or other organizations such as National Specialty Societies, Patient Safety Organizations, and Quality Improvement Organizations. <u>www.cdc.gov</u>

Public Health Registries collect several relevant data over long periods of time that is associated with varying costs. For example, patient's treatment and therapy(medication), laboratory (blood/tissue testing, radiology), hospital visits (outpatients/inpatients), and insurance costs. www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov

Every fiscal year, an amount is recommended from the Miscellaneous Section of the General Fund for the Virgin Islands Central Cancer Registry. In FY 2024 \$33,500 was recommended. \$47,000 was appropriated. **Please see Addendum I on pages 3 and 4.** Bearing this in mind, will the \$250,000 be used for the initial set-up and maintenance of Chronic Kidney Disease and Diabetes Registry or will an amount be appropriated every fiscal year from the General Fund for the Registry? Registries require continuous funding to remain effective like many other programs. Title 19, Part I, Chapter 6, Subchapter 1, Subsection 108 outlined the program funding for the Cancer and Autoimmune Disease Registries. **Please see Addendum II on page 5.** 

### **SUMMARY**

The Government of the Virgin Islands (Department of Health) will be responsible for creating and maintaining the Territorial Chronic Kidney Disease and Diabetes Registry. Violations of reporting provisions is subject to a civil fine of \$1,000-\$5,000 per case. Revenues may be generated if private or independent health care providers and health facilities violate the reporting provision. However, no fine was indicated for breach of confidentiality. If any person within the Department of Health (the Registry) discloses privileged or confidential information, who will be held liable? This may become an unforeseen cost to the government through litigations. Bearing in mind Section 126 in the bill only covers health care providers and health care facilities. Appropriating a lump sum of \$250,000 from the General Fund to establish the Registry may become stringent, as it may take several years for the Registry to become fully functional and beneficial. However, instead of appropriating the lump sum of \$250,000, a five (5) year appropriation of \$50,000 each fiscal year can be made to establish the Registry. Another source of funding that can be used is the Health Revolving Fund which consists of revenues derived from medical and dental services performed by the Virgin Islands Department of Health according to Title 33, Chapter 111, Section 3017.

## § 3017. Health Revolving Fund

(a) The "Health Revolving Fund" heretofore established in the Department of Health is hereby continued as a special fund in the Treasury of the Virgin Islands.

(b) The Commissioner of Finance is directed to maintain and provide for the administration of the Health Revolving Fund as a separate and distinct fund in the Treasury, and no funds therein shall be available for expenditure except as provided in this section.

(c) The Health Revolving Fund shall be constituted of-

All revenues derived from the Department of Health and medical fees which are authorized to be charged for dental and medical services.

All payments by the Department of Human Services under its contract with the Department of Health covering medical care for the aged.

All sums reimbursable to the Department of Health of the Virgin Islands from Federal Grants-in-Aid Programs, for costs of services rendered to all eligible patients receiving outpatient services from the Department.

All fines collected by the Department of Health pursuant to 19 V.I.C., § 1496 to be used exclusively for education programs on tobacco smoking.

(f) The Commissioner of Finance shall submit a quarterly report to the Governor and the Legislature listing all receipts and expenditures pertaining to the Health Revolving Fund.

(g) The Governor, upon the recommendation of the Commissioner of the Budget, and with the approval of the Legislature or the Finance Committee of the Legislature, if the Legislature is not in session, is hereby authorized to make transfers from the Health Revolving Fund to the General Fund. (h) The annual appropriations of the Health Revolving Fund shall remain available until expended.
