- 8 0012 to increase the National Guard Retirement Pension.

- 11 Commander of the Virgin Islands National Guard. It is an honor and privilege to
- provide written testimony in support of the Bill No. 35-0012 Act amending Title 23
- <sup>13</sup> Virgin Islands Code, Chapter 19, Subchapter III, section 1556 relating to the
- retirement from the National Guard to increase the retirement pension.

Bottom-Line Up Front: I commend the Government of the Virgin Islands for the
monthly \$100.00 payments paid to our National Guard Grey Area Retirees from age
55 to 60. I fully support increasing it to \$200.00 and recommend it be increased to
\$300.00 to meet the original intent of this bill.

*Context*: \$100.00 dollars in 1982 when this bill was originally passed is equal to 21 \$320.87 in 2023 per the (Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis Inflation Calculator) 22 https://www.minneapolisfed.org/about-us/monetary-policy/inflation-calculator. 23 The Virgin Islands Army and Air National Guard Soldiers and Airmen primary job 24 is to fight and win our nation's wars, while defending the Homeland and our way of 25 life. As our servicemembers are called to serve routinely in the territory over the 26 span of their 20 years plus careers to reach retirement eligibility. The geographic 27 location of the four noncontiguous islands making up the Virgin Islands creates 28 unique challenges all hazards and workforce challenges. Our territory's 29 undermanned medical support personnel; public works personnel; and Fire and 30 Emergency Service; and local and federal law enforcement agency leads to 31 routinely request support from the Virgin Islands National Guard in the territory. 32 In 1973 the draft for military service ceased after the Vietnam War, this began era 33 of our all-volunteer military serving today. Our local Army and Air National Guard 34 men and women who make up the all-volunteer total force continue to deploy in 35 support of the Combatant Commander's requirements around the globe. Our 36

Servicemembers have and will deploy to the Middle East, Africa, South America in 37 support of national interest, as well as to the United States southern border in 38 supporting Homeland Security missions. I am pleased to see the Virgin Islands have 39 gone above and beyond to recognize and support our veterans in the past. This 40 measures to increase the payment from \$100 to \$200 is not only honorable but 41 needed for these for some of our veterans. Currently, the Office of the Adjutant 42 General has 50 personnel receiving payments and can cover the increased cost from 43 May to September 2023 without additional funding. For Fiscal Year 2024, \$40,000 44 additional funds will be needed to add to the \$80,000 currently budgeted to provide 45 \$200.00 to identified 50 Grey Area Retiree. We can undoubtedly say that the 46 freedoms and defense support to civil agencies we enjoy every day in the Virgin 47 Islands and the nation come at a cost. At times, the cost of life, limb, or debilitating 48 injuries suffered by the men and women affects them emotionally and financially, 49 anything we can do to help our veterans is much appreciated. 50

*Closing:* In closing, I would like to thank this legislative body for the continued 52 support it provides to our Servicemembers, Veterans, and their Families. The Office 53 of Veterans Affairs estimates they are 8,000 veterans in the territory, but only 3,000 54 are registered with their office. We have approximately 8,000 Veterans in the 55 territory which is 0.091 percent of our 87,146 population (per 2020 Census). It 56 seems fiscally manageable to provide a total of \$120,000 annually for our 50 Grey 57 Area Retirees who selflessly and honorably served the people of the U.S. Virgin 58 Islands in our times of need. There should be no hesitation to vote favorably for this 59 legislative change. The Government of the Virgin Islands have and will continue to 60 call on our Army and Air National Guard for all hazards events supporting all 15 61 Emergency Support Functions to aid our governmental agencies. VINGs 62 capabilities significantly increases our government's ability to respond to 63 hurricanes, pandemics, public safety, environmental air and water monitoring, 64 weapons of mass destruction, counter drug, and support to homeland security 65 requirements to prevent/defense against terrorist activities in our territory. Our 66 Servicemembers, Veterans, and their Families thank you for your continued to 67 support. 68
