Committee, other committee members, other members of the 35th Legislature present, fellow testifiers,

members of the press, persons in the viewing, on-line viewing and listening audiences, ladies and

gentlemen. My name is Yvonne Petersen and I am the Executive Director of Beyond Visions

Foundation, Inc. (BVF); the Virgin Islands Developmental Disabilities Council, Inc. (VIDDC) and the

VI Family2Family Network, Inc. that is the Family Voices, U.S. Virgin Islands, an affiliate of the

Family Voices National organization. Before I begin the key segment of my testimony, it is necessary

to provide a brief overview the organizations I represent:

Beyond Visions Foundation, Inc. is an established local not-for-profit incorporated 1997, and

currently serves as the Family to Family Health Information Center for the U.S. Virgin Islands, a

federally-funded program through the Health Resources and Services Administration. The Virgin

Islands Developmental Disabilities Council, Inc. (VIDDC), the previous Family to Family Health

Information Center, works in collaboration with Beyond Visions to ensure families of children and

youth with developmental disabilities and special healthcare needs remain a key function of this DD

Coalition.

Additionally, the VI Family2Family Network, established as an IRS tax-exempt organization in

2022, was approved as the Family Voices National affiliate for the U.S. Virgin Islands this year. The

Family Voices, USVI partnered with BVF and the VIDDC to conduct community outreach, provide

training for parents to become parent navigators, conduct capacity building for parent/caregiver-led

organizations, health professionals and workers that serve or engage families of children and youth

with special healthcare needs.

As recent as last week, through contracting a community engagement consultant, Mr. Billy

Abraham and I visited medical facilities on all three islands; such as the modular hospital on St. Croix,

the Frederiksted Clinic, MCH on St. Thomas and the Morris De Castro Clinic on St. John. These visits

included, but are not limited talking with health professional staff, doctors and nurses, and inquiring

the needs that impact the population served by F2F Health Information Centers. Areas visited included

pediatric, family planning, high risk clinic, OBGYN clinic, and MCH. Such discussions revealed the

following needs (not comprehensive):

Testimony of Yvonne D. Petersen Committee on Culture, Youth, Aging, Sports and Parks • Assist in addressing the need of the high rate of diabetes in the territory through community

outreach and training to families.

• Asist with capacity building, training and community outreach to support parent-led

organizations of families with sickle cell or sickle cell trait.

• Providing support for genetic counseling community outreach upcoming activities.

• Promoting newborn screening for the various populations (both ethnic and those with language

barriers) in the VI.

Another key activity conducted was collaborating with Expecting Health from the state of

California in reviewing videos to promote and educate new and expecting parents about newborn

screening. This included working with VI expecting parents and those with newborns to review the

videos, provide feedback so they can be more beneficial to the needs of our population.

At this time, plans are being made for the January 2024 visit of the New York Mid-Atlantic

Regional Genetics Network (NYMAC) to meet with health providers and community leaders to discuss

their plans regarding the needs for genetic testing, education and training in the VI. This will include a

physician trained in genetics who will visit the VI on a quarterly basis. This information was discussed

when the community engagement consultant met with Senators Capehart and Fonseca, both members

of the Legislator's Health Committee.

One of the key achievements are as follows:

The DD Coalition members opened a Family Resource Center in the public housing community known

as Harvey on St. Croix and have recently opened an office on St. Thomas at Nisky Center that also include a training center. They work and assist each other and additionally are in collaboration with

organizations such as Christiansen Institute for Community Health and Empowerment and the

Disability Rights Center of the Virgin Islands.

With funding from MCH, Beyond Visions will assist with community outreach for newborn screening

with plans to include the VI's Spanish, Arabic and Creole population.

Some of the key challenges for the organizations is the following:

- Request local funding support: As the federal funds are not intended to provide the total costs of conducting the programs, and with the territories not having a level access to funding sources as those state side counterparts, assisting with funding to match the federal funds received through HRSA that supports families with children and youth with special healthcare needs will be helpful. This funding will assist in providing community outreach, training, support for parent navigators who provide one-on-one or group training for other parents and caregivers. We will request at least a 50-50 match on a territory wide.
- The U.S. Virgin Islands is the only jurisdiction that does not comply with the Developmental Disabilities and Bill of Rights Act of 2000, in short the DD Act. The DD Act funds, by federal regulations are intended to fund independent State Councils on Developmental Disabilities in each state and territory. However, in VI, the DD Act funds are requested and received by the Department of Human Services through their Consolidated Block Grant. Therefore, the VI DD Council receives no DD Act federal funding to conduct programs and services for the DD population.
