We gathered the facts....

1. Researched the Properties

Assembled a comprehensive data base on the 2,741 properties in the three National Historic Districts

Charlotte Amalie 1,408

Christiansted 860

Frederiksted 502

Public records data, tax rolls, ownership, zoning, etc.

2. Tested Public Opinion

Conducted a professional public opinion poll to learn residents opinions about the deteriorating historic properties and what should be done.

Facts cont'd....

3. Took a Look Around

Researched what other islands and communities are doing with their historic properties

- 4. Identified the problems they cause
- 5. Identified the benefits of preservation



The problems they cause.....

- Near commercial and tourist areas.
 Definite threat to public safety.
- Havens for crime, drugs, trash, vermin and squalor.
- Neighbors experiencing a rise in crime and threat to their property values.
- Produce little to no tax revenue.
 Millions in back taxes. Many taxed as vacant land.
- Consume disproportionate share of police and other resources.
- Government properties produce no taxes but large legal liability for their "owners" – the Virgin Islands taxpayers



The benefits of restoration

- Cut crime
- Create jobs
- Clean up neighborhoods
- Create tax producing properties
- Reduce government liability
- Increase housing stock
- Keep us competitive in the Caribbean



How many are there?

•451 historic properties rated Fair to Poor, i.e. "endangered"

•131 of them are historic



What do our citizens say about scenes like this?



Public Opinion Poll Results

- Public's top concerns (in order).
 - Crime/public safety
 - Economic growth/economy
 - Utility rates
 - Budgeting/cutting spending
- 82% said they were concerned over the negative impact of these vacant buildings (46% said very concerned.)
- 81% (55% strongly): "Support restoring & preserving historic properties"



Public Opinion Poll Results

- 72%: "Existing codes should be enforced with strong fines."
- 77% said "sell government properties. Put back on tax rolls."
- 77%: "Public-private partnerships would be effective method."
- 61%: "More police patrols in historic areas."





- Need common set of definitions for historic properties
- Need standardized rating system for "historic value", preapproved uses and amount/type of restoration required.
- Not every property can be 100% restored. Need flexibility for restorations that make economic sense.





 Current permitting process, authority, responsibility and appeal process should be reviewed as part of the solution.

Fines and incentives should be equally strong to be effective

motivators.



- We need the cadre of skilled and well-paid artisans and craftsmen these restorations would create.
- Creativity needed in identifying financial and other resources, e.g. collection of delinquent taxes, local bank consortium for low interest loans, federal & foundation grants. Explore how others have done it.





- Serious of falling behind other islands in restoration, revitalization, reinvigoration.
- USVI must invest in retaining its unique flavor, charm and attractiveness or risk becoming a "stale", outdated travel destination and investment opportunity.

Research Methodology

- 1. Public Records Data 2,741 properties in 3 Nat'l Historic Districts
 - Property Descriptions
 - Taxes: assessed value, taxes paid and taxes owed
 - Ownership: private, nonprofit, government
 - Zoning residential, business, commercial, waterfront
 - Use (single or multi-family, mixed use, institutional, business, vacant, parking, etc.


2. Field Survey


Properties in Fair or Poor Condition: 423








