Good morning Honorable Carla J. Joseph, Chairwoman of the Committee on Government Operations, Veterans Affairs, and Consumer Protection, to the Honorable Marise C. James, Sponsor of Bill No. 35-0058, members of the Committee on Government Operations, Veterans Affairs, and Consumer Protection, non-committee members of the 35<sup>th</sup> Legislature, employees of the Department of Property and Procurement, fellow testifiers, and the viewing and listening audience.

I am Magdalene A. Morancie, Esq., Chief Legal Counsel for the Department of Property and Procurement, and I am appearing on behalf of Commissioner Lisa Maria Alejandro. I appear before you, pursuant to your invitation, to provide testimony on Bill No. 35-0058, an Act amending title 29 Virgin Islands Code, by adding a chapter 25 to enact The Public-Private Partnership Agreement Act.

From our review, the Department understands the Bill seeks to create a framework for the use of public-private partnership agreements ("P3") in the Virgin Islands, as an alternative method for procuring services for the construction, development, maintenance, and operation of all types of public infrastructure. In creating this framework, the Bill outlines in detail the process a responsible public entity i.e., the Government would follow in either soliciting proposals for a P3 project or in accepting unsolicited proposals for the same. This includes the criteria for evaluation and approval of P3 projects as well as the requirements of the comprehensive agreement and available financing structure and options.

As written, this Chapter would be cumulative and supplemental to our existing procurement authorities in Title 31, Chapter 23, Sections 231 through 251 of the Virgin Islands Code. It does not replace or supersede any existing authorities available to the Government in



any respect. While the Bill proposes an alternative to the Government, the Bill still requires that the Government make a best value determination by conducting due diligence and making an informed decision on whether the proposed P3 path would be more economical and efficient versus pursuing the project through a traditional procurement method.

Public-Private Partnership Agreements have the potential to attract private investment in public infrastructure and can be particularly helpful in areas of strained public budgets to allow for development and long-term maintenance of public infrastructure. Notwithstanding, P3s are a source of financing rather than a funding source, so P3s are attractive to private investors where the project has a revenue stream, like user fees and tolls, to service the debt of the project and provide a return on private investment. Consequently, it is not the answer for all projects. P3 projects require significant financial, technical, and human resources for the review of the complex technical, legal, and financial aspects of the proposals and all resulting contracts. To ensure success and minimize risks to the Government, private partners must be properly vetted and meet professional industry standards and have the capacity to finance the approved projects. We recognize the Bill seeks to balance better delivery of projects to the public with protecting the Government's various interests and we look forward to engaging in further discussions on the topic.
