The Virgin Islands Police Department commends Senator Bolques for his commitment to the safety and well-being of our community, especially our most vulnerable members. This proposed legislation aligns with our collective responsibility to protect the welfare of infants and support parents facing difficult circumstances.

According to data from the Child Welfare Information Gateway, a program of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Safe Haven laws have proven effective in preventing unsafe infant abandonment. These laws establish safe and legal options for parents who feel unable to care for their

newborns, encouraging them to make responsible choices rather than resorting to potentially dangerous alternatives.

The Child Welfare Information Gateway reports that, as of January 2022, all 50 states in the United States have enacted Safe Haven laws, leading to the safe relinquishment of thousands of infants. The data highlights the success of these laws in providing a viable alternative to unsafe abandonment, preserving the lives of countless newborns, and sparing parents from the legal consequences of desperate actions.

By enacting the Safe Haven Newborn Protection Act, the U.S. Virgin Islands can join the broader national effort to protect newborns and support parents in crisis. The proposed legislation offers a compassionate and pragmatic approach, providing a legal framework for parents to make responsible choices without fear of legal repercussions, ensuring the safety of the child and offering much-needed support to parents in crisis.

In conclusion, Commissioner Ray A. Martinez and the Virgin Islands Police Department wholeheartedly endorse Bill No. 35-0173, the Safe Haven Newborn Protection Act. We urge the esteemed members of this Committee to consider the positive impact this legislation can have on our community's most vulnerable members and to support its passage.
