Good afternoon, Senator Kenneth L. Gittens, Chairman, Committee on Homeland Security, Justice & Public Safety, other committee members, 35th Legislature staff, my collegues, and those in the viewing and listening audience.

Presenting on behalf of Commissioner Kimberley Causey-Gomez, I am Miguel Tricoche,
Deputy Commissioner of Operations for the Virgin Islands Department of Human Services
(DHS). With me today is Community Affairs Coordinator and Mass Care Lead, Yvette C.
Henry and we are providing an update on the department's preparedness for Hurricane
Season 2023.

The Virgin Islands Department of Human Services is the **Lead Agency under Emergency Support Function 6 (ESF6) – Mass Care, Emergency Assistance, Housing and Human Services**. Sheltering is ESF6's most prominent function, however the ESF6 responsibilities also include Individual Assistance-Preliminary Damage Assessment (IA-PDA), Points of Distribution (PODS) for commodities if required and Donations Management.

The key support agencies for ESF6 are: American Red Cross (shelter operations), VI 40 Department of Agriculture (pet sheltering), VI Department of Education (shelter site and 41 secondary shelter feeding and nursing support), VI Police Department (shelter and PODS 42 security/law enforcement), VI Department of Sports, Parks, and Recreation (shelter site), 43 VI Department of Public Works - VITRAN Plus (pre-storm transportation of preidentified 44 special populations), VI National Guard (PODS operations), VI Department of Health 45 (medical special needs shelters ESF8), VI Waste Management Authority, VI Fire and 46 47 Emergency Medical Services, and VITEMA for shelter support and crisis management.

Shelter inspections began in January 2023. After shelter inspections, repairs and re inspections by multiagency teams including American Red Cross, VI Fire and Emergency
 Medical Services, VITEMA, FEMA, the VI Territorial Americans with Disabilities Act

51 Coordinator, the following are the official primary congregate evacuation shelter 52 locations:

53 PRIMARY CONGREGATE EVACUATION SHELTERS

54 **<u>St. Croix</u>**

The St. Croix Educational Complex will be utilized and has a total capacity of 2,034, depending on the set-up. The gymnasium bleachers out seating is 800, gymnasium court/floor is 248, cafeteria is 236 and auditorium fixed seating 750. Additionally, there is a quarantine room with a capacity of 16. It is also the approved pet shelter location for St. Croix.

The D.C. Canegata Community Center will also be utilized with a capacity of 161 and has a quarantine room set up for 8 individuals, as needed.

62 **<u>St. Thomas</u>**

The Lockhart Elementary and Junior High cafeteria has a capacity of 248, with a potential
to expand on capacity to selected classrooms. It is the approved Pet Shelter location for
St. Thomas.

The Ivanna Eudora Kean High School total capacity is currently 460, utilizing the gymnasium. There is a wheel chair access from the rear of the building to accommodate those individuals. The cafeteria was taken off the list due to repairs not being completed in time for the 2023 Hurricane Season and has a capacity of 161.

70 <u>St. John</u>

The Adrian Senior Center will be utilized with a capacity of 15.

DHS is in the final stage of approving a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) which will create an additional congregate shelter location on St. John with a shelter capacity of 140.

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77 **DISASTER PREPAREDNESS TRAINING**

Disaster preparedness training for all areas of ESF6 has been ongoing. The 2023 78 USVI Capstone Initiative for all territory stakeholders was conducted from May 22 - 26, 79 2023. The disaster preparation drills included shelter operations exercises on St. Thomas 80 at Eudora Kean High School and on St. Croix at the St. Croix Educational Complex High 81 School. In addition, on May 25, DHS, VITEMA, and the VI National Guard verified **Points** 82 of Distribution (POD) sites for issuing food and water following a storm, and trained 83 individuals, including 77 volunteers, on managing a POD site with the assistance of the 84 Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). 85

All DHS department-wide mandatory training on Mass Care was conducted on June
2, and on Shelter Operations conducted by American Red Cross on June 9, 2023.

88 **Pet Shelter Training** was conducted on Friday, August 18, 2023.

From August 28-31, 2023, Volunteer and Donation Management Training led by
FEMA was held on St. Croix for territory stakeholders.

91 ELDER, DEPENDENT ADULT AND DISABLED PERSONS DISASTER REGISTRY

92 Under the authority of Act. No. 8058, DHS established and maintains a registry of persons 93 60 years and older or having a disability and living alone. Currently there are 889 94 individuals listed in the registry. DHS utilizes a mass messaging system to notify 95 registrants of any important information including for any storm related information and 96 support following a disaster. All individuals were personally contacted by DHS over the 97 summer to verify that the information listed on the registry was correct.

98 CLOSING

99 DHS would like to assure the community that with the support of VITEMA, our local 100 partner agencies and FEMA, we continue to train and to build capacity to ensure that not 101 only ESF6, but <u>all</u> 15 ESFs and public and private partners can work together to facilitate 102 safe, effective implementation of disaster management plans in the unfortunate event 103 that we might need to execute them. I want to thank Governor Albert Bryan, Jr., and Lieutenant Governor Tregenza Roach for their continued leadership and guidance. I also want to thank the dedicated and hardworking employees of the Department of Human Services, who go above and beyond, especially in times of disaster.
