FY2023 HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS TESTIMONY SEPTEMBER 12, 2023

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Good afternoon - Honorable Kenneth L. Gittens - Chair of the 9 Committee on Homeland Security, Justice and Public Safety -10 Committee Members, other members of the 35th Legislature, 11 listening and viewing audience. People of the United States Virgin 12 Islands. I am Police Chief Sean Santos of the Virgin Islands Police 13 Department St Croix District, today along with my colleague Police 14 Chief Steven Phillip of the St Thomas-St John district. We are both 15 very pleased to represent the United States Virgin Islands Police 16 Department (VIPD). We appear before you with the goal of 17 presenting updates to the department's preparations now that we 18 are in the hurricane season. The 2023 Atlantic Hurricane Season 19 began on 1 June and will end officially on 30 November. 20

Under the capable leadership of Commissioner Ray Martinez and his dedicated executive team, the Virgin Islands Police

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Department (VIPD) remains steadfast in its commitment to prepare for and respond to the needs of the Territory. VIPD, serving as the lead agency for Emergency Support Function 13 (ESF-13) — Public Safety & Security, continues to collaborate seamlessly with our local and federal partners, focusing on stabilizing the critical Community Lifeline of Safety & Security. This includes maintaining law and order, site security and access control and traffic control especially during evacuations or any mass movement of people and critical operational supplies.

Under Virgin Island Code, Title 23, the VITEMA Act (5233) of 1986 The Governor may authorize use of Territory resources by declaring a "State of Emergency". Upon Governor Bryan's prompt declaration of a pre-landfall state of emergency, a pivotal action occurs: all government law enforcement agencies across the territory promptly report to the Police Commissioner, making themselves available for mission assignments. The Virgin Islands National Guard also stands ready to lend support to VIPD, deploying either full-time force members or activating M-day or its

traditional membership under State Active-Duty orders,
strengthening our collective response effort. Requests for military
support for law enforcement missions will be coordinated between
the Commissioner of the VI Police Department and the Adjutant
General of the VI National Guard and then forwarded by the
Commissioner to the Governor for approval.

Effective ongoing coordination between VITEMA, the Port 47 Authority, and the US Coast Guard, ensuring the timely 48 deployment of both Police and National Guard resources to St. 49 John, preempting any port closures that may impede their mission. 50 In the event of a disaster declaration, VIPD can swiftly request 51 additional law enforcement resources through the Emergency 52 Management Assistance Compact (EMAC), engaging key partners 53 for support such as the New York Police Department (NYPD) and 54 others. 55

Notably, a significant enhancement to this year's hurricane preparedness and response capabilities is the utilization of VIPD unmanned aerial systems (UAS) or drones. These advanced drones

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play a pivotal role in conducting search and rescue missions, providing aerial analysis of various communities for damage assessment, and supporting escort efforts and crowd control at Points of Distribution (POD) sites when the need arises. This aerial support capability greatly bolsters the effectiveness of response and support operations.

In addition to aerial support, VIPD Marine assets have become indispensable in fulfilling the critical need for community support. In the event of port closures at the Cyril E. King Airport (CEKA) and the Henry Rolston Airport (HERA) these assets are instrumental in facilitating the movement of manpower and supplies throughout the district islands, ensuring the swift and efficient response to the demands of the community during emergencies.

Moreover, upon the establishment of a curfew by Governor Bryan, VIPD swiftly institutes traffic control points (TCP) across the islands. These TCPs are strategically placed to ensure road safety and to effectively control unauthorized traffic on the roads

during times of curfew. More importantly the TCPs are designed to and to provide freedom of movement for those critical supplies and support elements across the islands. VIPD continues its vital support to key agencies, including the Water & Power Authority and the Department of Public Works. These departments are extremely critical to the restoration of our community. The VIPD remains responsive to 9-1-1 calls until the onset of Tropical Storm Force winds (at speeds of 39 mph), after which they shelter in place until the storm passes, and sustained winds drop below Tropical Storm Force levels. This comprehensive approach underscores VIPD's unwavering commitment to the safety and security of the community in the ever-evolving landscape of emergency response in 2023.
