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- 3 Good morning, Senator Kenneth L. Gittens, Chairman, Committee on Homeland
- 4 Security, Justice & Public Safety, other committee members, 35th Legislature Staff,
- 5 and those in the viewing and listening audience.
- 6 I am Daryl D. Jaschen, Director of the Virgin Islands Territorial Emergency
- 7 Management Agency (VITEMA). I am providing testimony today to Bill No. 35-
- 8 0131, an Act amending title 3, Virgin Islands Code, chapter 15, to establish a "Real
- 9 Time Crime Center" Centralized Crime Data System, within the Virgin Islands
- Police Department, with the mission to provide the VIPD with the ability to
- capitalize on a wide and expanding range of technologies for efficient and effective
- policing, dated September 12, 2023, sponsored by Senator Diane T. Capehart.

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- I support this bill but caution on the adequacy of \$2,500,000 dollars to achieve the
- build out of two (2) the Real Time Crime Center, and the lack of identifying
- funding for continued maintenance and staff of personnel to operate a Center in
- each district. VITEMA receives approximately \$1,000,000 dollars per year from
- the 9-1-1 Emergency Services Fee just to maintain and upgrade its two 9-1-1
- 19 Emergency Communications Center (ECC) systems as mandated by the Federal
- 20 Communications Commission (FCC), not including the costs of staffing the
- 21 Centers or providing any Fixture, Furniture, or Equipment (FFE).

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- Additionally, Standard Operating Procedures must be developed for the use of
- each component to include handling of requests based on the Freedom of
- 25 Information Act (FOIA) from organizations such as the American Civil Liberties
- Union (ACLU) as well as the archiving information / data retention on each data
- 27 platform. The ACLU is an American nonprofit human rights organization founded

in 1920. The organization strives "to defend and preserve the individual rights and 28 liberties guaranteed to every person in this country by the Constitution and laws of 29 the United States". One of the concerns from the ACLU and what has come about 30 from other states developing increased public surveillance through similar Real 31 Time Crime Centers, is if there is any requirement for police to provide a detailed, 32 legally enforceable plan to govern how the new surveillance tools can be used. 33 Such a plan would have to include information about the proposed technology's 34 functionality, intended uses, and restrictions, as well as what protections will be 35 put in place to ensure the technology is used in a constitutional and non-36 discriminatory manner. Just like 9-1-1 ECC, is the data retained in the Center able 37 to be subpoenaed by legal counsel and will members of the Center be required to 38 called to court and provide testimony to support data integrity, chain of custody, 39 and validation of evidence? 40 41 My suggestion is that this committee assess the total costs over a 5-year period 42 before allocating any funding to the creation of the Real Time Center and well as 43 determine an oversight responsibility for the Center. If Federal Grant monies are 44 identified to support the Centers, they usually come with the local cost share 45 percentage and do not include any maintenance costs. This Committee has 46 obviously identified a need for the Territory to have a Real Time Crime Center but 47 what is the expected return on investment and what key performance indicators 48 (KPIs) have been established to ensure its continued success. I would recommend 49 evaluating the creation of a single Center and based on its success and established 50 benefits, then look at a second Center. 51 VITEMA supports the basis of this bill but recommends reviewing the funding 52 source for Center covering its initial 5-years. The costs for data communications

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- monthly fees and annual software maintenance fees must be considered as part of
- 55 the total cost of implementation for these Real Time Crime Centers.
