Bill No. 36-0105 - An act amending Title 7 Virgin Islands Code, Chapter 13, Subchapter III by prohibiting the possession, sale, or manufacture of tetrahydrocannabinolic acid, delta-6 THC, delta-8 THC, and delta-10 THC products in the Virgin Islands and for other related purposes

- 1 Good day, Honorable Senator Carla J. Joseph, Chair of the Committee on Rules and Judiciary;
- 2 Vice Chair Senator Kenneth L. Gittens; Committee and non-Committee members; and those of
- 3 you viewing and listening. I respectfully submit this written testimony on Bill No. 36-0105 for
- 4 inclusion in the official record of today's proceedings.
- 5 I would like to take a moment to highlight the Environmental Health Division team which
- 6 continues to inspect high-risk businesses with high impact on our community members. Their
- 7 dedication to the goal and objectives of the VI Department of Health and more specifically the
- 8 policies and mandates identified by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) is admired and
- 9 appreciated. A big thank you goes out to all of the members of the VIDOH Team for the work they
- do every day to keep our community healthy and safe. We would like to thank the Honorable
- 11 Governor Albert Bryan, Jr., and the Honorable Lieutenant Governor Tregenza A. Roach for their
- 12 continued support of our mission which is "To Reduce Health Risks, Increase Access to Quality Healthcare
- 13 and Enforce Health Standards."
- 14 Thank you for the opportunity to submit testify on Bill No. 36-0105 An act amending Title 7 of
- the Virgin Islands Code, Chapter 13, Subchapter III by prohibiting the possession, sale, or
- manufacture of tetrahydrocannabinolic acid (THCA), delta-6 THC, delta-8 THC and delta-10 THC
- products in the U.S. Virgin Islands and for other related purposes.
- 18 While delta-9 THC the primary psychoactive component of cannabis has long been
- regulated, other derivatives like delta-6, delta-8, and delta-10 THC are increasingly being
- 20 marketed and sold as legal alternatives. Many of these products are manufactured synthetically,
- often using unregulated chemical processes, and can pose serious risks to consumers.
- 22 Recent reports from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the FDA
- 23 underscore the dangers associated with these products, including increased reports of adverse
- 24 health effects, such as dizziness, confusion, vomiting, and hallucinations, contamination risks
- 25 from untested manufacturing processes, and accidental poisonings among children and
- 26 adolescents due to misleading packaging and labeling. The potential for addiction, cognitive
- 27 impairment, and long-term neurological harm makes proactive legislation essential.
- 28 The dangers delta-8 and similar derivatives pose to children cannot be overstated. Too often, these
- 29 products are packaged and marketed to resemble candy, snacks, or soft drinks—deliberately

- 1 designed to entice young people. One moment of accidental ingestion could result in
- 2 hospitalization or worse. Without clear regulatory frameworks, these products circumvent existing
- 3 cannabis controls and put our children at considerable risk of early exposure.
- 4 The Department of Health is fully prepared to implement Bill 36-0105 through our existing
- 5 regulatory infrastructure and Food Code authority. Our Environmental Health Division currently
- 6 conducts routine inspections at retail food establishments across the territory, and we will integrate
- 7 enforcement of this prohibition into these established protocols. Under Food Code Sections 3-
- 8 202.12 and 3-201.11, we have clear authority to embargo and remove products containing
- 9 unapproved food additives from retail establishments.
- 10 The FDA has explicitly classified delta-8 THC as an unapproved food additive, making any food
- product containing these substances adulterated under federal law. When our inspectors identify
- delta-8, delta-10, or THCA products during routine inspections, we can immediately issue hold
- orders under section 8-903.10 and coordinate with the DLCA and the Industrial Hemp
- 14 Commission for follow-up enforcement actions. This approach requires no additional
- infrastructure or policy changes. It is simply the application of the established food safety standards
- to protect Virgin Islands families from products that have generated over 2,300 poison control
- calls nationwide, with 41% involving children. The Department stands ready to begin enforcement
- immediately upon passage of this legislation.
- 19 This legislation recognizes the paramount responsibility we hold: to protect our youngest and most
- 20 vulnerable. It draws a clear line, ensuring that no economic interest can override the duty to
- 21 safeguard our children and families. Prevention must come before a crisis. By prohibiting
- 22 possession, sale, and the manufacture of these substances, if passed, this legislation can reduce
- 23 youth access, protect brain development, and decrease the likelihood of future dependency issues.
- 24 Beyond regulation and enforcement, prevention requires responsible advertising and proactive
- community education. The Department of Health is committed to leading efforts that ensure the
- 26 public receives accurate, transparent information about the risks associated with hemp-derived
- 27 intoxicants and all cannabis-related products.

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We call upon industry partners, community organizations, and media outlets to join us in

- 1 rejecting marketing practices that glamorize or misrepresent these substances. Advertisements
- 2 must never target youth or vulnerable populations, nor should they obscure the
- 3 potential harm. Instead, messaging should reinforce safe, legal, and responsible use while
- 4 discouraging misuse.

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- 6 Equally important is education. Through school-based programs, public awareness campaigns,
- 7 and partnerships with healthcare providers, we can equip Virgin Islanders especially our
- 8 youth and families with the knowledge to make informed choices. Education about product
- 9 labeling, safe storage in the home, and recognition of signs of intoxication will strengthen
- 10 community resilience and reduce preventable harm.

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- 12 In closing, we must continue to foster innovation and economic opportunity, but never at the
- expense of public health. This bill strikes the right balance: supporting economic development
- while standing firm against unsafe and unregulated products. Several U.S. jurisdictions,
- 15 including New York, Colorado, and North Dakota, have already acted to restrict or ban synthetic
- and semi-synthetic THC derivatives due to similar concerns. Supporting this bill aligns the
- 17 Virgin Islands with national public health best practices and demonstrates our commitment to
- evidence-based policymaking. Furthermore, the FDA has not evaluated or approved delta-8,
- delta-10, or related compounds for safe use in any context. Given the lack of federal oversight,
- 20 local action is both necessary and urgent.
- 21 The Virgin Islands Department of Health is committed to protecting the health and well-being of
- 22 our residents. By supporting Bill No. 36-0105, the Legislature will take a crucial step toward
- 23 reducing public health risks, protecting our youth from early substance exposure, and ensuring
- safer, evidence-driven policies around cannabinoid regulation. Our Department is prepared to
- 25 work together with the Legislature and our partner agencies to build upon the progress made and
- strengthen our systems.
- We thank the sponsor of this bill for his proactive leadership and urge the Committee to advance
- 28 this measure. The VI Department of Health stands ready to work with lawmakers, community
- 29 partners, and healthcare providers to ensure its effective implementation.
